




VIGILADA MINEDUCACIÓ







# INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC ASSOCIATION'S WOMEN IN LEADERSHIP IN ECONOMICS INITIATIVE

Economic research plays a crucial role in shaping global perspectives on governance, business, and public policy. However, gender disparities in professional leadership, compounded by ethnicity, race, and geography, demand immediate action.

The International Economic Association's Women in Leadership in Economics Initiative seeks to investigate the challenges faced by women economists and promote their advancement in the field. It prioritizes expanding the pipeline of qualified women economists and removing structural barriers, paying special attention to the intersectionality of geography and race to identify and address multiple disadvantages.

Led by eminent economists, including Ashwini Deshpande, María Inés Berniell, Raquel Fernández, Dani Rodrik, and Fiona Tregenna, the initiative is funded through the generous support of the Co-Impact Foundation and the Open Society Foundation.

The project has two main arms that encompass a comprehensive approach – researching the structural barriers women economists face and amplifying women economists' voices.

For the research arm, IEA is commissioning evidence papers to build a comprehensive database of women in economics, and research on interventions to advance women in economics in the following countries – Argentina, Colombia, Ghana, India, Mexico, Senegal, and South Africa.

For the amplifying voices part, the IEA has partnered with media organizations such as Project Syndicate, VoxDev, and VoxEU to publish the research and opinions of women economists, with a focus on those based in developing countries. Writing for media platforms allows women economists to share their expertise with a broader audience, fostering a more inclusive economic narrative. They act as role models for future generations, inspiring young women to pursue careers in economics. This empowerment cultivates a cycle of diverse and inclusive economic participation for years to come.

Navika Mehta is appointed as Economist-Editor to be a liaison between women economists and our partners, facilitating the publication of articles related to their work, aligned with the news cycle, offering mentoring, and editorial support. To provide you a glimpse of the impact of the initiative, here are examples of articles recently published through our project by Ashwini Deshpande, Odile Mackett, Lili Yan Ing, and Anisha Sharma.

The IEA's Women in Leadership in Economics Initiative represents a significant step towards achieving gender parity and diversity within the economics profession.
